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Art Class Visits Chattanooga Museum for Field Trip

Carter's Advanced Art Two and Three classes went on a field trip to Chattanooga to the Hunter Museum and the Sculpture Fields last Thursday, October 17. At around 8:50, the classes left on the 12-hour field trip in two different buses, totaling about 40 students. The drive there was an hour and a half to the Hunter Museum, which is an art museum divided into three parts and dedicated to art of all genres and time periods. The main

part is the mansion, which was built in 1904 and was lived in by Ross Faxon, a wealthy insurance broker. In 1952, the mansion became the Hunter Museum of American Art. After about two hours at the museum, the classes headed to the sculpture fields and stayed there until four. They had a picnic in the middle of the field and then went off in groups to sketch. The classes then headed to the Hamilton Mall for dinner; they stayed there for an hour and were

allowed to go wherever they wanted as long as we were back at the doors by 5:30. After a long ride that most of the students were asleep for, they got back to the school around 7:40 that night. Both art teachers, Ms. McCulley and Ms. Adams, went on the trip with the students. When asked why she wanted students to have this opportunity, Ms. McCulley said, "I think it's good for you guys to be able to get a chance to do art outside of school."
