COURSE DESCRIPTION: The study of European settlement of North America and the role of geographic features within the early settlement of the Thirteen Colonies. The examination of political, cultural, and economic influences leading to the American Revolution. The development of the US and its government. The expansion of the US including domestic and foreign policies including issues that affected American Indians and African Americans. Major events and issues leading to the Civil War and the resulting era of Reconstruction. Tennessee history, government, and geography in context with US history will also be covered to illustrate the role our state played in American history.

Board Policy I-431 Issued: 7/95 Revised 6/08
