Carter High School Named Rewards School for Top 5% progress in the State of Tennessee

7 ith much excitement, Carter High School was recently named one of the five Knox County Schools to receive a reward for progress. The Tennessee Department of Education releases a list of schools every year where they evaluate the schools based on annual growth measured by schoolwide value-added data. Carter High, along with Sequoyah Elementary, Powell Elementary, Farragut High, and L&N STEM Academy, were recognized as a part of the top five percent in the state of Tennessee for annual progress. The Superintendent of the Knox County School system,

Dr. Jim McIntyre, said, "It is great to see several of our schools recognized for their performance and progress in being among the top five percent of schools in the state. This is reflective of the overall hard work happening in our classrooms, the great work that our teachers and students are doing, and the support of our community so that we continue to see an upward trajectory in student learning and success." Carter students and teachers alike should be recognized for their exceptional work throughout the year and encouraged to keep up the good work in upcoming years.



National Honors Society Rolling Out the Red Carpet for Principal Siebe

arter High School is experiencing a change in administration for the 2013-2014 school year. New head principal, Ryan Siebe, has started the school year with hornet pride as he is getting to know the staff and students in this new chapter of his life and career.

Ryan Siebe's education began at Milligan College where he received a Bachelor degree for Arts in English in 1998. He then attended Tennessee Tech University pursuing a Master's degree of Arts in Instructional Leadership in 2006, as well as an Educational Specialist degree in the Knox County Leadership Academy five years later. Over the course of fifteen vears. Siebe has worked at nine different schools across Knox County and beyond, performing a wide variety of jobs ranging from teaching to administrative positions. Most of his career was spent at Farragut High School as an English teacher. Among his achievements, he has received the Teacher of the Year Award (2006-2007), the Outstanding Teacher Award (2004), and a nomination for Who's Who Among American Teachers (2000-2006). Siebe has a supportive family including his wife Shannon and his three sons. Among Siebe's hobbies, he is a hunting and fishing enthusiast and a soccer fan, watching both Liverpool and his sons' teams.

As the new principal, Mr. Siebe has hopes to make Carter High School a more recognized institution. One area he hopes to focus on is enforcing the possibilities that the school and students have to earn more academic achievements honors. What is his favorite thing about Carter so far? He answered, "I love the tight community and collective communal belief in hard work."

In a recent interview with Mr. Siebe, he explained how eager he was to start getting the Carter High School name out in the community surrounding areas. asked to elaborate on this he said "We have been named a reward school and have been placed in the top five percent in improvement, but despite this prestigious award the Carter High School name is rarely a thing of major discussion. This is something that I am working hard to change and make our school known". Mr. Siebe has been firing up the social media hub with his twitter account (@carterprincipal) out reminders and tweets of encouragement to all students and athletes. Siebe also states that he loves "being involved in the community". You can find him with his wife and three boys at numerous school sponsored events being welcomed by the Carter community. TAP incorporates strategies that align with Common Core State Standards

The Teacher Advancement Program (TAP) is now in its third year of implementation at Carter High School, and we are seeing positive results from this program. Carter High School received a 5 (the highest level) in Value Added scores for the 2012-2013 school year and has been named a Reward School (top 5%) in the state for making progress in student achievement.

Now that we have begun teaching Common Core State Standards (CCSS), we realize that we have been on the right path with the strategies we have developed the last two years. During the 2011-2012 school year, teachers and students focused on the STRIVE vocabulary strategy, teaching students how to break down words to learn definitions and to include visual clues to remember vocabulary, such as drawing pictures of the word's meaning or another related visual.

Last year, teachers and students focused on how to identify text

features, make connections, and predict meaning about informational text using various text features. Our school's data showed that students difficulty reading charts. graphs, and other visual information. Students were asked to look at titles, subtitles, bold words, sidebars, tables, and other visuals specific to their different content-area classes to determine the meaning of an author's text. In band, art, and Career Technical classes, students examined music, types of art, and business documents, such as spreadsheets and technical drawings, to learn their material better.

This year, students will continue to focus on Informational Text with an emphasis on determining the stated or implied main idea and specific details of a document and then citing evidence from the text to support their thinking. Students will also be asked to synthesize evidence from two or more texts as they become more proficient in analyzing difficult

texts.

Teachers will continue to implement Common Core State Standards in literacy and numeracy to better prepare our students for college and career readiness. For more information, visit the TNCore.org website.

Before the walk across the stage begins for the Class of 2014, there are a many things seniors must do to prepare for life after high school, especially since graduation is less than seven months away. Seniors might want to use this dates-to-remember checklist to ensure they are prepared for post-secondary opportunities.

October

- •Finalize college essays
- •Check the Scholarship list published in the College & Career lab and online at the Counseling Department's fusion page.
- •Apply for your FAFSA pin. (www. fafsa.ed.gov)

November

- •Finalize and send any early decision or early action applications due this month.
- •Request Transcripts and make sure your ACT/SAT scores have been sent to colleges directly from the testing company.

December

•Your goal should be to have all applications complete by the end of the first semester.

January

- •Begin filing the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA). This can be done online at www. fafsa.ed.gov.
- •Attend the FAFSA help workshop on Jan. 21.
- •Remind your counselor if colleges to which you have applied require a mid-year report.

April

- April 15- this is the common final notification date for colleges.
- •Make your final college choice after you receive your acceptances. Decline any offers of admission in writing so that colleges may admit other qualified candidates.
- •Let Mrs. Sharp know when you have been accepted and made your final decision. There will be a sheet in front of her office to fill out.

May

- •May 1-this is the deadline for you to notify colleges of your final decision.
- •Remember to accept financial aid offers and follow the instructions given.
- Make sure you have submitted the senior survey including the final transcript request.

May 15- Graduation!

Mrs. Sharp, senior counselor, says, "If you have questions, come see me or Mrs. Hooper, we can't help you if you're not here. We look forward to seeing all the awesome things you are going to do with your future."

Mrs. Hooper, the graduation coach, said, "We would welcome anyone to come to the college and career center between classes or during lunch to research colleges and careers."

Carter Select Choir goes A Cappella

arter High School choir director Jessica Strutz is working → hard to take the music department to the next level. In early September the choir held auditions for the new A Cappella group. Tryouts consisted of singing a verse and chorus of a song a cappella, and doing a group improvisation where six to eight people in each group make different noises to create a beat. The decision of who made it and who did not was very tough for the three judges. Over thirty-two students tried out for the group, but only eleven were kept, as these groups are traditionally small. When asked why she decided to add this group, Mrs. Strutz said, "People call me all the time asking me if I have a group to perform at different events around town and I always have to decline because it is too difficult and expensive to travel with a large group of choir students." This is the high school's first a cappella group since the 1980's and the group will be the premier performing group to represent Carter High School in the community. Strutz continues, "I'm so excited about a cappella group. We asked new A Cappella group member Carley Chollman how she felt about getting to be a part of the after school group, she stated "I'm so excited that I'm getting to be a part of this group! Singing is such a passion of mine and being involved in something as unique as an a cappella group is a great experience to have." Mrs. Strutz along with the help of Carter High alumnus, Brooke Boring, will be leading the group to have a successful year of performing at several events around town including The Fantasy of Trees in December.

A Hawaiian Thanksgiving for the CHS Band

or the Carter High School Band, the late November trip to Hawaii took roughly two years in the making. It began during another trip in the opposite direction of Hawaii in the United Kingdom where the band marched for the 2010 London New Years Day Parade. Based on that performance, an invitation was received to have the CHS Marchina Hornets perform in the Waikiki Parade in Honolulu, Hawaii. A previous invitation had to be postponed because of the difficulty to raise funds for two expensive trips just months apart. For that reason, the trip was chosen for this year, the 72nd anniversary of the attack on Pearl Harbor.

In preparation for the trip, Matt McCurry, Director of Bands and Chuck Brock, the percussion director, "shadowed" another band on a preview trip to get a basic sense of the performances that will occur during the band trip. Mr. McCurry stated, "We decided that it would be a fantastic trip. Pearl Harbor is like nothing you've ever seen." Once the decision was made, it took several fundraisers to get the money to travel to Hawaii. Some of the students sold

fruit, discount cards, chocolate bars, designer bags, candles, and cheese and sausage. Finally, the only step left is to wait for the day for the band to leave Tennessee for Hawaii during Thanksgiving break.

The trip will begin in the early morning hours of Wednesday, November 27th where the band will leave via Premier Transportation and head south to the Hartsfield-Jackson Atlanta National Airport. The band will leave on a 10:00 A.M., non-stop, flight that will have 134 seats

reserved for the band students. chaperones, directors, the former principal of Carter High School, Cheryl Hickman. The flight will take roughly 8 to 10 hours to arrive at Honolulu National Airport. On Thanksgiving Day, the entire group will have a day of nonstop events, buffet eating, and relaxation on a "secret island." On Friday evening, the band will have their first performance in the Waikiki Holiday Parade. The next two days will be spent exploring some of the different locations and attractions that Hawaii has to offer, including a Diamond Head Hike and a visit to the Polynesian Cultural

Center. On December 2, the band will travel to Pearl Harbor for a second performance at the sunken battleships of the USS Arizona and USS Missouri, where the scars of a day that lives in infamy can still be observed. They will then return to the continental United States on Tuesday December 3 and arrive back at CHS the following morning. The stage is set for another major performance by our nationally recognized band, this time on the Pacific stage.

Carter HS choir students make All-East Choir

he All-East Tennessee Choir is an honors choral program for East Tennessee high school students. Students wanting to participate in all east choir must audition for a spot in the program. There are three different choirs. Students do a general audition and are placed wherever the judges feel they would fit best between three groups; men's choir, women's choir, and a mixed choir. Many students participated in Saturday workshops that are offered to better the students' auditioning skills. The workshops helped students with reading their music and learning the required musical selections for their audition. When auditioning for the All-East Tennessee choir, students must prepare two pieces of challenging choral music and also sightreading (sing music that they have never seen) for a panel of judges.

All-East Auditions were held on September 28th at Heritage High School in Blount County. CHS Juniors Nate Paul and Elizabeth Benn were both accepted as participants in the 2013-14 All-East Choirs. Nate Paul received a spot in the Men's Choir, and Elizabeth Benn received a spot in the Mixed Choir. 
Sophomore Brittany Mathis sends the ball downfield.


CHS Cross Country
